

Bright, Bold Butterflies

Some butterflies are one color. Some have stripes. Others have spots. Some butterflies have circles on their wings. They are called eyespots because they look like eyes! Color in the butterfly. Use stripes, spots, eyespots, or any other pattern you like.

Ladybug Lookalikes

The ladybird beetle is a common type of beetle. It is also known as the ladybug!

Some ladybugs have lots and lots of spots. Others have no spots at all. The seven-spotted ladybug has (you guessed it!) seven spots. One of the spots is spread over both wings.

Draw a line from each ladybug to the one that looks exactly alike. Count the spots as you go!

Bees love flowers. They use their long tongues to drink nectar from flowers. Bees also eat pollen, which is a yellow dust that flowers make. That's why you'll see lots of bees buzzing around gardens and patches of wildflowers.

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Which is Which?

All insects have three main body parts: head, thorax, and abdomen. All insects have six legs. The legs are attached to the thorax.



1. Label the insect's body parts by drawing lines from the words to the body part they describe.



2. Draw a line from the insect's description to the photo of the insect.

Weevils have a long thin head that looks like a snout.

Ants are social insects. They live in big groups.

Many flying insects have four wings. But flies have only two wings.



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
